Creating Teaching Resources for Children

Readily Available Materials for Teaching Chinese

- Flashcards and sticky notes: use them for vocabulary walls, word matching and sentence-building exercises.
- Coloured paper and markers: ideal for interactive charts, character-writing practice and posters.
- Magazines and newspapers: great for storytelling and reading comprehension activities.
- Plastic bottle caps or pebbles: use them for interactive games like character matching and tone practice.
- Mobile apps and online tools: platforms like WhatsApp, Quizizz and Pleco etc. enhance self-paced vocabulary learning.
- Household objects: everyday items such as cups and toys can introduce new vocabulary and reinforce concepts.
- Songs and rhymes: help learner's master pronunciation, tones and sentence formation.
- Engaging resource persons: invite local community members to share cultural insights and language experiences.

Tailor your materials to the specific needs of your learners:

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- Young learners (Ages 4-7): picture-based flashcards, songs and hands-on objects.
- Intermediate learners (Ages 8-12): sentence-building activities, storytelling and role-play scripts.
- Advanced learners (Ages 13+): newspaper articles, idioms and discussion prompts for cultural analysis.

Different learners process information in different ways. Here is how you can adapt materials:

- Visual learners: use illustrated books, videos and mind maps.
- Auditory learners: incorporate songs, rhymes and listening exercises.

Kinaesthetic learners: engage them with crafts, hands-on activities and movement-based learning.
