Session 2: Applying suitable strategies to facilitate learning of the organizational structure of the school management.

What is an organisational structure ?

Organizational structure refers to the way in which the roles, responsibilities, tasks, and authority are divided and coordinated within an organization.

Key Elements of Organizational Structure:

1. **Hierarchy:** The levels of authority within the organization, from top to bottom. This defines who reports to whom and the chain of command.
2. **Roles and Responsibilities:** Clearly defined roles ensure that everyone knows what their tasks and duties are, reducing confusion and improving efficiency.
3. **Departmentalization:** The way tasks and functions are grouped together. For example, in a school, departments might include Mathematics department, games department and boarding department.
4. **Centralization vs. Decentralization:** Centralized organizations have decision-making concentrated at the top, while decentralized organizations distribute decision-making to lower levels of the hierarchy.
5. **Communication Flow:** This refers to how information is shared within the organization. Clear communication is essential for effective decision-making and teamwork.

Importance of Organization Structure:

- **Clarifies Authority and Responsibility:** It helps define who is responsible for what tasks and who has the authority to make decisions.
- **Enhances Efficiency:** By organizing roles and responsibilities systematically, the structure helps prevent overlap of tasks and ensures that work is divided appropriately.
- **Improves Communication:** Clear organizational structures make it easier to establish communication channels, leading to better collaboration.
- **Supports Strategy and Goals:** A well-defined structure aligns the organization's activities with its overall objectives, making it easier to achieve goals.

Session 3: The relationship between the school and the community.

What is the relationship between school and the community?

1. **Educational development** - The school provides Education to community members while professionals and elders in the community contribute by mentoring and sharing knowledge.
2. **Community involvement in school affairs** - Parents and community leaders are in school BOMs and PTAs and also sponsorship and scholarships.
3. **Service to the community** - School organises community service programmes to engage students and the community in activities such as tree planting, cleaning and cultural events.
4. **Employment opportunities** - Schools provide jobs for teachers and support staff. Local businesses also provide goods and services to schools.
5. **Cultural and social integration** - Schools promote local culture through music,drama and traditional

ceremonies. This brings the school and the community together

6. **Health and wellbeing initiatives** - School partners offer medical checkups programmes , educate students and families on health issues and disease prevention.
7. **Security and discipline**- The school works with local authorities to ensure safety and health in monitoring activities and reporting cases of indiscipline or insecurity.
8. **Disaster response support** - Schools serve as emergency shelters and relief centres during crises like floods.
